How to dress for a career fair

"Dress for the job you want, not the job you have."

This is a common phrase you will hear after you graduate. You can start working on your professional image by dressing confidently at career fairs and networking events on campus.



Your first impression with a recruiter or alum attending a career fair is important.

Employers and the CCD want to create an inclusive environment where you can feel confident and focus on making connections, not what you are wearing.



The suggested dress for career fair events is "business casual."

For the last few years, career fair attire has become more relaxed. While some students will wear full business suits, this is no longer the norm or expectation from employers.

Likewise, employers want to appear approachable. You will find most employers in a "business casual" attire – collared shirts, khakis, and even dress jeans.

Recruiters wearing company t-shirts is becoming more common, too.

You can never go wrong at a career fair with these simple guidelines:

- Collared shirt as a top (long-sleeve or short-sleeve is fine)
- Tuck in your shirt (unless it is tailored to be untucked)
- Slacks, khakis, chinos, dress skirt, etc.
- Wrinkle-free clothing

EXAMPLES OF "BUSINESS CASUAL" (SUGGESTED CAREER FAIR DRESS)



Creating a professional environment helps all students feel more confident and focus on relationships, not clothing.

Make a good first impression, and please avoid wearing:

- Distressed jeans (rips, tears, etc.)
- Sweats/joggers/yoga pants/workout clothes
- T-shirts
- Shorts

We don't want your nice clothes to get damaged with a nametag pin or sticky label residue. When you arrive at the career fair registration area, the CCD will provide you a simple blue or green nametag lanyard, a plastic nametag holder, and an cardstock insert. The colors help employers identify your interests.

- Green lanyard: Signifies you are looking for a full-time job
- Blue lanyard: Signifies you are looking for an internship

Similarly, when approaching an employer's table, look for employer nametag ribbons (attached to their nametag) to know which recruiter would be the best to talk to (green ribbon for full-time, blue ribbon for internships - some employers will have both ribbons).

On your nametag insert (which you will get when you check in), write your:

- First name
- Major or Program
- Class year

CLOSING ADVICE

In addition to dressing confidently and professionally, finish it off by being well-groomed, including:

- Brushing your teeth (and your tongue, where a lot of bacteria grows)
- Combing/brushing your hair
- If you choose to wear perfume/cologne, take it easy and don't wear too much
- Polishing your shoes (if wearing dress shoes)
